RESCUE DURING COVID

Spring is already a tough time for rescuers as we start getting inundated with calls about moms and kittens, so when COVID-19 shut down everything in mid-March, it definitely hit us hard. Cats definitely do not socially distance, so they continued to breed as we scrambled to help in any way we could. Both of our low-cost spay/neuter clinic partners were completely shut down by April, giving us nearly no spay/neuter options during one of our most critical times of year. Our three store adoption centers in PetSmart and Petco—which normally account for 50+ adoptions a month—were also shut down until late June or early July, leaving us to find safe ways to get cats adopted from our own homes. Many of our foster parents have underlying medical conditions that prevent them from taking in rescues or doing adoptions during the pandemic. Others found themselves suddenly unemployed, making it a financial challenge to bring in homeless animals.

Despite all of these difficulties, our amazing rescuers continued to take in hundreds of cats and kittens, working hard to get them fixed and adopted into new homes.

We are thankful that most of our spay/neuter providers have resumed and our adoption centers are open for business! However, months without these services created a huge backlog of need. There is currently a 1- or 2-month wait for a spay/neuter through Cat Coalition, and our wait list just keeps growing. In the past 2 months alone, we've been contacted by more than 350 people who need help with spay/neuter for more than 450 cats—and we only have around 125 clinic slots available every month right now.

Before she was rescued off the streets after likely being abandoned by a previous owner, Angela roamed from one home to another in the Nedrow neighborhood. She started her legacy by having a litter of kittens who grew up feral because they were born outside and not socialized during their early life. The woman feeding them did not know how to handle the situation and the colony grew. Being wary of traps, Angela roamed on for a couple of years,



having many more litters around the area. Those kittens grew up to reproduce as well, all becoming feral. Finally, a plea through the neighborhood Facebook page brought assistance from someone who wanted to help the cats.

Having surprisingly trapped four ferals on her very first try, she realized she had no plan to get them fixed right away. There were simply not enough appointments available on such short notice. A call to the Cat Coalition brought a volunteer to help house the ferals until appointments were available. This scenario played out over several months: trap two cats per week, transport them to and from a partnered vet, recover them inside in wire dog cages, and release them back to their colony just after trapping the next two ferals. Any young kittens who could still be tamed were put up for adoption through the Coalition. However, Angela remained elusive.

Finally, after three years of fixing or adopting all the cats in the original colony, another Facebook post with a photo of a cat and her six kittens alerted the trapper that this was the female that started it all—Angela! Quickly heading over there with traps and carriers, she caught Angela, who by that time had grown nervous around people. Estimated to be about 5

years old, Angela actually turned into a loving kitty once in foster care! She loves to be petted and be around people, and enjoys watching the birds from the inside out. She talks in cute little chirps even when she purrs and cuddles under the bed covers if she can.

Lucky Angela was eventually adopted into a loving forever home, finally closing the chapter of homelessness and breeding that went on for too long. She's a perfect example of how one unspayed female (and at least one unfixed male) can lead to a serious overpopulation problem and why EVERY cat needs to be fixed!
